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Life after death book of mormon

What happens after death? People have been asking this question for millennia. It's one of the most enduring questions of the soul. The reason for this is quite simple: death is a fact of life. Everyone must carry out the death of their loved ones and the real possibility that they themselves will die. This reality was as much in the minds of the early Latter-day Saints as in anyone else's mind,¹ and they were blessed to receive some of the most detailed reports of life in the after-life life through the Prophet Joseph Smith (see D.P.D.). The Book of Mormon expands or clarifies several important truths about after-death life. For example, the prophets of the Book of Mormon taught clearly about the state of the soul between death and resurrection (Alma 40:11).³ Alma taught his moody son, Corianton, how the righteous are taken into a state of goodness called paradise, while the evils would be in darkness, and in a terrible, fearful state seeking the fiendous indignation of God's wrath upon them (Alma 40:12 , 14).⁴ James taught that both states would eventually give birth to the dead, both righteous and evil. , so that the resurrection could pass over all people (2. Amulek made it even clearer that all rise from the dead and stand before God, including both the evil and the righteous (Alma 11:42, 44). Thus, the Book of Mormon makes it clear that resurrection is a blessing extended throughout Christ (Mosias 15:20).⁵ The second coming of John Scott's Jesus Christ The Book of Mormon is also very clear about the physical nature of resurrection. Amulek explained: The spirit and body are reunited in their perfect form; both the limb and joint are returned to their right body, just as we are at the moment (Alma 11:43). He continued: Even the hair on their heads must not be lost; but every thing is returned to its perfect framework as it is now, or in the body (Alma 11:44). Of these, there can be no doubt that resurrection restores its physical body.⁶ Why LDS researcher Robert L. Millet wrote: In restoring divine truths about God's plan of salvation, we know where we come from. We know why we're here. And we know where we're going when death invites each of us to pass the stand that separates time and eternity. ⁷ Nowhere does the plan of salvation be taught more clearly and fully than the Book of Mormon.⁸ Robert T. Barrett's Great Council while the Bible teaches in the Book of Mormon about the spirit world and resurrection⁹ these principles are set very clearly. Without it, many Christians do not know the state of the soul between death and resurrection. There are also considerable differences among Christians as to whether evil and if the resurrection is a literal, physical event, or only spiritual or metaphorical. The Book of Mormon resolves these questions clearly and simply, not only through the doctrines taught by the writers it inspires, but also through the concrete manifestations of the resurrected Lord Jesus Christ, about which it speaks vividly (3Rd). However, the Book of Mormon was only the beginning of the revelation after the after-death life in this sentencing period. As mentioned above, Joseph Smith had several insights into the subject, and the revealed insight came to light at the beginning of the 20th century, when Joseph F. Smith had a vision of life in the spirit world (D.P.D. 138).¹⁰ Thanks to the Book of Mormon and these other revelations, latter-day Saints are now blessed with greater knowledge of the next life than any other known group of people in history. Knowing the Lord's plan when death comes brings comfort, hope, and certainty to those who lose loved ones or who themselves feel the end of mortality approaching.
